



What is Visual Thinking Strategies?



Watch this <u>video</u> to learn more about VTS.

Use the Visual Thinking Strategy (VTS) questions below to orient readers, and to help guide a group discussion. Begin by taking a quiet moment to look closely at the book jacket, allowing time for observation and contemplation of the images.

If virtual, ask your students to summarize (or you paraphrase if synchronous) their ideas in short notes in a Google Doc or other format (Padlet, etc.) Build on the group ideas and communal knowledge during your discussion.

- What is going on in this picture?
- What do you see that makes you say that? (provide evidence)
- What more can we find?


### **MEET ANNE**


Anne Sibley O'Brien is a children's book writer and illustrator who has published 38 books featuring diverse children and cultures inspired by her experience of being raised bicultural and bilingual in South Korea as the daughter of medical workers. Titles she has written and illustrated include the picture books, *I'm New Here* and *Someone New, The Legend of Hong Kil Dong*, and her middle grade novel, *In The Shadow of the Sun*, set in North Korea. Annie received the 2014 Katahdin Award for lifetime achievement from the Maine Library Association.


















# **LET'S TALK!** Discussion Questions

#### TAKING A CLOSER LOOK AT THE BOOK

Answer these questions and make a chart about what you know before and after reading the book:

#### Before Reading:

- 1. What do you know about North Korea?
- 2. What are the differences between North and South Korea? Physically? Socially? Economically? Politically?
- 3. What have you heard about North Korea in the news lately?

#### After Reading:

- 1. What do you now know about North Korea that you didn't know before reading the book?
- 2. How are North Korea and South Korea different, and how are they the same? What about the United States and North Korea—Similarities? Differences?
- 3. What is totalitarianism and how does it affect individuals (citizens and non-citizens) within a totalitarian nation?
- 4. Did reading this book change you in any way? How did this book affect you personally?



# LET'S CREATE (AND DO)! Book-Inspired Art

- 1. Six-word portraits and self-portraits: Draw portraits of some characters from In the Shadow of the Sun, and carefully choose only six words to create a mini-biography. Then, draw a portrait of yourself, and finish it with six words about yourself to create a mini-memoir.
- 2. Draw images to summarize the story by creating a storyboard using this <u>TEMPLATE</u>. Using anywhere from six to 24 panels, break down the story into its major plot points, and illustrate them.
- 3. Write up a packing list of items you would bring with you on a harrowing trek through the North Korean countryside. Based on Mia and Simon's experiences, what would be some of the most important supplies to have?
- 4. Check out this LIT TRIP of the book created by a librarian and her middle school team.

# **LET'S DIVE DEEPER!** Explore More

- 1. Anne introduces her book via video in English and Korean. <u>LISTEN</u> to the beginning of the audiobook, check out Anne's photos from her non-trip to North Korea, read detailed notes and blog entries on her journey through writing the book, and learn from Anne how to use children's books to explore Korean culture and identity.
- 2. View <u>PHOTOS</u> from the space station to see how, at night, North Korea looks vastly different from surrounding countries.
