These are questions third graders from Deer Isle Stonington Elementary asked author Kim Ridley after reading, researching, and discovering the creatures in her book, *Extreme*

Survivors, Animals That Time Forgot. IRW, in collaboration with the Island Heritage Trust, created an eight week program for children in grades 3 and 4. After participating in a final Zoom discussion with Kim and the children, Director of School Programs Alison Johnson's excitement was palpable. She was gushing with pride and enthusiasm for the dynamism and thoughtfulness of what she had just experienced, and asked if we could extend the learning with Kim and keep the conversation going. Without hesitation, the answer was a resounding yes!

This is but one example of an exchange between children and a visiting author during an IRW program that expresses the excitement children have for reading and learning. During these challenging Covid-infested times, not only are we fortunate to have deep relationships with our partner

schools, but also with incredible authors and illustrators who care about children and their learning. During their visits, whether in-person or remotely, they thoughtfully explore their stories and creations with children, stretching their imaginations, honing their thinking and communication skills, and igniting their curiosity.

As we enter 2022, we look forward to expanding our webbased programs to reach individuals across Maine and beyond. We'll be honoring children's book illustrator and author Ashley Bryan throughout the year, offer our Popup Book Shops and community-wide events, continue our professional learning programs for educators and booklovers, and provide a robust program of authors and illustrator visits to our 26 partner schools. 
In October 2021, Sophie Blackall visited Vinalhaven, North Haven and Isleboro—IRW's first in-person programming since the onset of the pandemic! It was a joy to share her book *Hello Lighthouse* and make art with children in person. Other schools continued with virtual programming, such as Zoom sessions with science writer Kimberly Ridley around her book Extreme Survivors, Animals That Time Forgot at Deer Isle Stonington Elementary School. Students were wide-eyed and full of wonderful questions!

Our middle grade book groups continued this fall. Each program included an introduction to the

author, a writing workshops, and Q&A session. Lauren Wolk, Gary Schmidt, and Anne Sibley O'Brien were gracious in their flexibility as we navigated school schedules impacted by Covid. The creative writing produced in these workshops demonstrated the kids' unending ability to invent wild ideas!

Though uncertainty remains a major factor in our planning, we continue to coordinate special programs for spring and beyond knowing how important these creative opportunities are for the children we serve. We'll explore two important historical figures through Steve Costanza's, King of Ragtime, The Story of Scott Joplin and Alexandra Hinrich's book, The Traveling Camera, Lewis Hine and the Fight to End Child Labor. Creativity, we know, is an outlet for imaginations to sort through challenges and allow space for positive growth and problem solving and a way to hone critical thinking skills. We think picture books are the perfect place to explore and grow our curiosity. Thanks to all who help make these special programs possible!




Winter 2021 Booklist


