






Meet the illustrator





TAKING A CLOSER LOOK AT THE BOOK

1. How would you describe Jamie to someone who has never met her? What words would you use to describe her?

2. Have you ever been so involved in a project that you felt like you did not want to talk to people or answer questions about your work? What were you work-ing on at the time?

3. The following quote comes from the book: "*Jamie and the sea and the woman are friends*." Do you think it is true?

4. What do you think the author means when he says, "*The sea tells stories but it doesn't ask questions*?"

5. On the second to last page where you see Jamie's entire finished creation count how many items she used that came from nature and how many were man-made.

6. Were you surprised by the woman's painting on the last page? Why or why not?
