



- What is going on in this picture?
- What do you see that makes you say that? (provide evidence)
- What more can we find?

# DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

What surprised you most about this book?

How did Brand, Steve, and Topher feel when Ms. Bixby announced she had cancer and couldn't finish out the school year? How would you feel if a favorite teacher made a similar announcement?

How would you spend your last day on earth? Where would you go? What would you eat? Who would you want to spend it with?

What was your reaction to the boys' plan to skip school, sneak into the hospital, and give Ms. Bixby a great last day? Would you do it if you were in their shoes?

What is your favorite 'Bixbyism' from the book? Try to come up with your own.

How does Ms. Bixby impact all 3 boys? (saving Topher's drawings in a folder, taking Brand grocery shopping, displaying Steve's honorable mention ribbon.)

How do the boys impact Ms. Bixby?

How do the boys stand up to the guy that steals their money in the liquor store? How would you react?

How does Steve's relationship with his sister change over the course of the book?

Brand feels like he doesn't have a talent like Topher's drawing and Steve's intelligence. What do you think is Brand's talent?

When Brand steals Topher's notebook and sees his sketch of Ms. Bixby, they get into a fight. What was your reaction to this scene? What would you have done?

What do you think was the most significant challenge the boys faced during their adventure? What is your opinion on the way that they handled it?


After reading this passage, think about what your own "carnation day" would include. Make a list and/or draw a picture of your day.


How many "Bixbyisms" can you find in the book? Make a post-it poster and add your own.


## LET'S DIVE DEEPER! EXPLORE MORE
