


MEGAN FRAZER BLAKEMORE

PROTOTYPE

Using the Design Process in the back of the book (problem, identification, brainstorm ideas, design, test/retest and share) create a **PROTOTYPE** solving a problem in your own life. Think of something you need to fix or something that helps you do a task more efficiently. This could be an item to help in the kitchen with cooking or something to help hold a pencil or, like Frankie, something to help feed a pet when you are away.

Use your imagination!

What are your three favorite animals? Using parts (such as ears of a dog, head of a gecko and tail of a monkey) from all three of your animals, design and draw a picture of your new, made up animal. Be creative!
