Meet the illustrator











DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Why do you think "Luigi" decides to go along with pretending he is a kitten?
- 2. Discuss a time when you wanted to be someone/something else in this world. What made you choose this? How do you think you would be treated?
- 3. Talk to your classmates about the lesson or **moral** of the story.
- 4. What surprised you most in this story?

LET'S CREATE (AND DO)! Book-Inspired Art

- 1. Self-Acceptance: Write a thank you letter to yourself about the qualities you are happy you have.
- 2. SPIDER VS KITTEN: Use the Venn Diagram in Appendix A to compare the two types of characters.

MORAL:

the lesson, message, or principle that can be learned from a story, event, or experience.

SELF-ACCEPTANCE:

the ability to embrace and acknowledge oneself fully, including strengths, weaknesses, emotions, and experiences, without judgment or selfcriticism.
